8. Recognition programs acknowledge and appreciate staff contributions, making employees feel valued and motivated. This increases their commitment to their work and fosters a positive work environment.

9. Flexible scheduling options, such as adjusted work hours or telecommuting, allow healthcare workers to manage personal commitments better and reduce stress, leading to improved work-life balance and sustained engagement.
